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

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St. Albert Marks 5 Decades of Catholic Education

January 2015. St. Albert Catholic Schools' Foundation for the Future began a half-century ago with the founding of Council Bluffs' high school in fall 1964.

The school brought together three Catholic high schools: St. Francis, Mount Loretto, and St. Joseph's in Neola. Middle school grades were added to the campus in 1999, with a new elementary addition and early childhood center opening in 2009.

Named for St. Albert the Great—an academic known for his prowess for natural science, mathematics and theology—the school has been celebrating its golden anniversary by honoring those areas.

An anonymous gift allowed St. Albert to renovate about 20 classrooms original to the 1964 building as what President Joe Connolly called a "a birth-day present."

Each classroom received new doors, windows, heating, fire sprinklers, and paint. The school also was brought up to fire code as part of the transformative project.

"It's a phenomenal project and a great way to celebrate the school being 50 years old," Connolly said.

Mathematics and its related disciplines were marked with the launching of the school's new Project Lead the Way engineering curriculum along with expanding its offering of advanced high school classes.

A new crucifix, dedicated during the Feast of St. Albert, highlighted the school's religious commitment, along with advanced theology offerings added this year.

"The crucifix is meant to reflect the church's re-



spect for tradition and embrace of innovation and learning," artist Michael Montag said.

The 25-foot steel cross and bronzed clay corpus, the body of Jesus Christ, nailed to the cross, reflects a mix of modern and ancient.

Recycled steel for the cross was reclaimed from the bleachers at the former Rosenblatt Stadium in Omaha, with an abstracted design reflecting the razor's edge of modern art and technology.

The corpus, on the other hand, was made using bronze with a realistic depiction of Christ to reflect the past, present and future wrapped together.

"The cross is not a relic of the past," Montag said. "It is a part of this world."

St. Albert also celebrated its students and alumni during its anniversary homecoming week in September. Festivities included a golf tournament, an all-school Mass, tours of the school, alumni photos, spirit days for students and volunteer activities conducted by the school's students.

The theme the annual Community Involvement Day is: "To much is given...much is expected," a quote from the Bible's Gospel of St. Luke.

"The whole reason we do this Community In-



volvement Day is give back to our community," Connolly said. "We let the students learn about service and that it's an important part of adult life."

Principal David Schweitzer said St. Albert students provided more than 1,500 hours of community service through the annual event.

Community service is embedded in St. Albert's culture. Freshman are required to do 12 hours of community service; sophomores must do 14 hours; juniors are required to do 16 hours; and seniors do 18 hours.

Half of those hours must be used at one of the seven parishes that support the school. After four years of high school, each student ends up with 60 hours of community service.

Emmett Tinley, the parish business manager of St. Patrick Parish, helped assist students during the homecoming volunteer day.

"It's great because it's hard to find people to come

and do jobs like this and get a job well done," he said. "Plus it gives them an opportunity to serve their community."

More than 40 enrichment and extracurricular activities are paried with pathways for students who are planning on attending prestigious, regents or regional colleges. The private Catholic school graduated all of its seniors last year, and all of its graduates go on to pursue higher education or military service.

Of those Class of 2014 graduates, 65 percent are attending four-year colleges and universities, according to the school.

"From ABCs to ACTs, St. Albert provides a foundation for the future," Schweitzer said. "Building on 50 years of excellence, St. Albert's elite cradle to college and faith-filled environment is unmatched in Southwest Iowa."

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St. Albert Pleased with #SA_Day Participation

A one-day social media campaign at St. Albert Catholic Schools reached hundreds as part of its Catholic Schools Week celebration.

Abby Jares, the director of community relations, said more than 500 alumni, supporters, students, parents and others used the #SA_Day hashtag to connect with the school.

"Participation on social media was far and away the more important part of the day," she said in an email.

"Our community did a wonderful job showing their school spirit!"

A related fundraising effort did not hit its \$10,000 goal, which was to supplement the 2014 Hilltop Fund to enhance the school's security system. Jares said the combined total for the fund after the #SA_Day collections was \$67,850, which was in excess of the original \$40,000 target.

"So together, both fundraisers far exceeded our expectations," she said.

"The supplemental funds from #SA Day will be used to help enhance our security cameras."

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STEM Classes offer Job Skills, Problem-Solving Challenges

January 2015. St. Albert Catholic Schools focuses not only on welcoming Christ into its classrooms but also offering a variety of opportunities for science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

The commitment to both reflects the school's namesake, St. Albert the Great, an intellectual known for his academic knowledge of natural science, mathematics and theology.

"In this day and age, we're becoming a much more technological society," teacher Jeremy Hulshizer said. "What we're trying to give students a pathway to do these careers and do these jobs that society is asking us for."

Hulshizer—who teachers freshman physical science, physics, algebra 2 and engineering at St. Albert—said the school wants to expose its students to 21st century careers and the STEM skills the need in the modern workforce.

His principals of engineering class, for example, starts by teaching applications of physics and chemistry, such as electronics using circuit boards and mechanical engineering using simple machines.

Students are currently learning civil engineering, and they will also cover computer programming and robotics automation by the end of the school year.

Junior Erik Jensen said he can transfer some of the lessons in engineering to other aspects of his life, such as working on his car.

"I think there is a practical application for it," he said. "Most of the stuff we've learned has been relevant information and I've been able to take some of it home with me."

Jensen and his friends took apart some electrical equipment recently and rewired it, skills learned in engineering that allows him to start tinkering



with equipment to learn on this own. Eventually, he said he wants to pursue a career in mechanical engineering.

"It's a good paying career and there's plenty of job opportunities," he said.

STEM classes aren't limited to upper-level electives, though. Junior high school students at St. Albert are exposed to the Gateway to Technology class as one of the exploratory courses designed to give them exposure to engineering.

Ellerie Tarbox, a seventh-grader who took the class first quarter, said the class focuses on design and dimension. She learned how to use a computer to create blueprints, trying together simple shapes into complicated objects.

"I wanted to learn more about computer and technology," she said. "My dad is a computer programmer and I wanted to learn more about it because it seemed interesting."

With the push of a button, designs "just came to life," Ellerie said. She said the experience was "really cool" and she would like to have job that involved design someday—although she wants to explore other engineering disciplines.

"Learning one type of engineering can help you with other types," she said. "It can help you in daily life how to do simple things and learn the





science about it."

Elementary school students at St. Albert are exposed to STEM through their regular classroom instruction, just like junior and senior high students, but also through the school's First Lego League robotics club.

Fifth-grader Amara Orth is in her second year with the club. In addition to work with the robotics, she designed a web app as part of this year's contest for the extracurricular activity.

The game—which is accessible at arcade.gamesalad.com/games/126714—allows students to practice arithmetic problems by clicking on an answer before it floats off the screen.

"The knowledge of the technology we learn in Lego club helps me when I'm at school and the computer is not working," Amara said. "I can help with my computer and help with others in my classroom."

The club meets regularly to practice programming Lego robots to perform different missions, such as making a robot lift an object or drive through a course collecting items. "We practice our different missions and we try it until we get it to the best of its ability," Amara said. "One of the missions is we have to pick up a couple rings, so we have to program the robot to use its little arm mechanism and pull up the ring. There is another one where you have to throw the ball."

She said she recommends the club to her friends.

Most people I know get really interested in robotics," Amara said. "I love to build things out of

Legos. When I heard there was robotics, I wanted to try it out."

Students in STEM classes at St. Albert, whether it is algebra or engineering, learn problem-solving skills.

Hulshizer referred to a famous observation by Thomas Edison that he did not fail by experimenting to create the light bulb, he had thousands of successes finding materials that didn't work.

"It's OK to fail and learn something from it," Hulshizer said. "One of the greatest skills you can teach students in STEM classes is problem-solving." Page 10 The Tradition

Four pillars metaphorically hold up St. Albert Catholic Schools.

To the three aspects highlighted by Catholic Schools Week - Faith (St. Albert says Spirituality), Knowledge (Academics) and Service (Community) - the Council Bluffs school also adds Enrichment, a variety of opportunities to grow through extracurricular activities and opportunities beyond the core curriculum. Literally holding up the school are those who make up its community. Educators and staff who keep the school day running, along with parents, clergy, parish members and others who contribute in their various ways.

And students like senior Kelsey Fagan, junior Rachael Gronstal, senior Manny Onate and junior Travis Miller, who are the raison d'être for St. Albert and future alumni who will continue to back the school's programs.

Fagan said she is one of three students who took Advanced Placement American literature, which was offered through assigned readings and discussion posts online as well as a test at the end of the semester, instead of requiring the students to travel to lowa Western Community College.

"The size really affects it because you get more interaction with your other students and with your teacher," she said. "I also like how we have professors here who are able to teach the subjects instead of us going to lowa Western and coming back to school."

"She said one of her extracurricular activities — playing the Sour Kangaroo in the 2014 production of "Seussical the Musical" — have her confidence and is something she wants to continue in college.

"It just really gets you to be more self confident," Fagan said. "That feeling of accomplishment is really nice." Cronstal, the junior class president, said the school's culture makes a difference, especially since almost everyone is involved in activities.

"I like that everyone knows who everyone is," she said. "You'll know everyone, and they'll know you."

She said she took two religion classes last semester, which was initially a shock but ended up being a benefit for her faith.

"It was nice getting different teachers perspectives," Gronstal said. "The teachers are closer to you, and you build a better relationship with your teachers, so you can relate to them better than you can a priest."

Onate said St. Albert offers a lot of personalized learning and opportunities, including participating in concert choir, plays and musicals.

"I'm leaning toward going into the theater arts, performance for theater," he said. "The one on one time is very beneficial."

St. Albert offers enough activities that any student can find a way to become involved, even if they are shy at first. He said the community service requirements also teach you about volunteering.

"It does feel good to


give back, so you start giving back of your own will," Onate said. "There is a ton of leadership opportunities available and various activities. Developing those skills while you're still in high school is just pivotal and growing. It prepares you to be a leader."

Miller said he finds lessons at St. Albert fun because the faculty enjoy what they teaching. He said he transferred from Treynor in fifth grade.

"It's fun to learn when your teachers enjoy what you're doing," he said. "One of the most important things was being able to talk about God in a classroom."

Although he's not Catholic, the juwho is at the top of his class and who has taken several Advanced Placement classes already – said he has learned a lot about his Christian faith. "I have been able to learn a lot more about what I believe in," Miller said.

His favorite aspect of St. Albert, though, is its environment, which he summed up in one word: "Friendliness."



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Scrip Program Saves YOU Money on Tuition!

If you are not a current Scrip user, we encourage you to sign up for the program! You could save hundreds off your tuition bill (for a current or future child) simply by purchasing gas and groceries each week.

With a minimal amount of planning you can make a BIG difference to your tuition bill and help support SA without selling or buying anything that you don't already use (e.g. groceries, gas, clothes, prescriptions & restaurants)!" Mrs. Gronstal encourages all families to start saving on their tuition. Scrip is a gift certificate or pre-paid card that can used just like cash at the retailer named on the card. The cards are sold to Saint Albert at a discounted rate. This discounted rate is from 2% to 25%. Saint Albert sells them to people, like you, at face value. Saint Albert then splits the discount betweens the school's operating budget and wherever the person buying



the scrip designates on their registration form –for a student's tuition, parish or tuition assistance.

For example, if you purchase a \$100 No Frills gift card, which gives back 4%, \$2 goes straight off your tuition bill and \$2 goes to the school. Imagine how much you could save off your tuition if you ordered just \$100 for groceries weekly!

There are over 250 national retailers who sell scrip to Saint Albert. In addition, we have close to 30 local retailers that sell us gift cards. A complete list of retailers can be found on the Scrip page of the school's website. There are no fees to buy scrip. The scrip order form shows the amount of the discount the retailer gives to the school.

We welcome Mrs. Gronstal as the new Scrip Coordinator and look forward to her ideas to help the Scrip Program continue to grow.

Frequently Asked Questions

How does Scrip generate revenue for Saint Albert?

Participating retailers agree to sell gift certificates to Saint Albert at a discount. Families buy the certificates at Saint Albert and redeem the certificates for full face value. Saint Albert keeps the difference in the revenue. The percentage of profit returned to Saint Albert varies from 2 to 17 percent depending on the retailer.

How does my family benefit from Scrip?

The revenue returned to Saint Albert from the retailers will be split between the school's general operating budget and tuition for a student or students specified by participating families.

How many retailers are involved in the Scrip program?

More than 200 retailers are involved in the program. A list of local retailers (Council Bluffs and Omaha) will be provided to participating families when they sign up, and a complete list of all participating retailers is available on the Shop with Scrip website at www.shopwithscrip.com

How do I sign up?

Families can sign up by completing the Scrip Waiver Form and returning it to the Business Office. The Scrip Office is open Mondays from 8 AM to 2 PM and Thursdays from 8 AM to 5:30 PM.

How do I order Scrip?

You may place your order online at www.shopwithscrip.com or contact Lisa Gronstal, the Scrip Coordinator, at (712) 329-9000. Orders are due by 12 PM (noon) each Monday and then available for pick up on Thursdays. Your order can also be sent home with your child. Note: If you have more than one child enrolled at Saint Albert, please specify which child the Scrip should be sent home with.






