St. Albert works on making progress this year by Scott Stewart, Nonpareil Education Reporter

St. Albert Catholic Schools will work on transitions this year.

Sixth-graders will join their classmates as part of a new middle school concept, replacing the former junior high school wing of the PK-12 campus.

Dave Schweitzer, the school's secondary principal, will prepare to replace Joe Connolly, who will wrap up his fifth full year as the school's president.

The school also will continue to transition the 50year-old portion of its building into a modern space, with renovations wrapping up this summer on restrooms following last year's classroom remodeling.

Lastly, more 4-year-olds will make the transition to being students this year after St. Albert added a third section of its prekindergarten program.

"In June, we found ourselves pretty full and had a pretty lengthy waiting list," Connolly said. "We've added a third section of 4-year-old prekindergarten. We're blessed to have an available classroom to do that."

The school usually has room for 48 prekindergarten students, but this year it could have up to 72. Enrollment is about 60 right now, but Schweitzer said he expects the rooms will be full by the end of the year.

"People wanted to be here," he said. "Families really responded well."

Discounts have helped as well, with a \$500 reduction per student offered to families new to the school in first through 12th grade. Connolly said



that move reflects a trend in Catholic education across the country.

"That savings up front is an appropriate benefit for people who are making a commitment to our school," Schweitzer said.

Connolly said St. Albert can be more affordable than lower-income families expect. Those elementary students qualifying for the maximum grant from the Catholic Tuition Organization can have tuition less than \$100 a month, he said.

"That's made it more affordable for more families," Connolly said.

Those families will find improved facilities for secondary students. Last summer, the school worked on classrooms, improving heating, air conditioning, lighting, finishes, doors and other hardware. This summer, the school completed the second phase, renovating the restrooms in the main part of the junior-senior high areas.

"If we look at the 50-year-old part of our building, we've been through the two academic wings," Connolly said, adding that work still needs to happen on the central wing including the secondary office, cafeteria, gym, locker rooms

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and chapel. "There are some areas in there that need the same sort of updating."

An anonymous donor gave an undisclosed amount to complete the first two phases. Contractors have provided some in-kind donations, Connolly said, and "And parish support," Schweitzer added. "We had to nearly all of that significant donation has been spent.

Security improvements were also made this summer, However, St. Albert has turned the corner by paying including new parking lot cameras.

Schweitzer said parents now just need to give a vehicle description and time to report misconduct, instead of having to identify the student or deduce who might have been in the area at the time.

"We can go to the video and pull that information up and confront the student directly," Schweitzer said.

Having that improvement helps to increase accountability, he added.

"People behave better when they have a sense that somebody knows what they're doing," he said.

One additional change this upcoming year will be in the chaplain's office, Connolly said.

The Rev. Ross Parker went to the St. Joseph Parish in Des Moines, he said. St. Albert's new chaplain is the Rev. Fabian Moncada, who comes from Des Moines' Sacred Heart Parish. He will assist with ninth-grade religion, faith formation and the campus ministry team, Connolly said.

St. Albert's faith formation program, School of Faith, is also being replaced by the Diocese of Des Moines' new program called Faith Journey. Connolly said it's similar to what St. Albert piloted and will consist of six sessions over the school year with presentations on various aspects of the Catholic faith.

The Rev. Paul Monahan, the school's senior chaplain, will also hold weekly reflection and faith sharing events, Schweitzer said.

"We're a lot different from public schools," Connolly said. "They have to count on the government, and we have to count on the kindness of our community."

be very conservative in previous years."

off its elementary school and moving forward with renovation projects now that enrollment has solidified, Connolly said. He said gracious donors have been the key to making progress.

Looking forward, Schweitzer said faculty compensation is something he wants to address. He said he wants salaries to be more comparable with those in the surrounding public schools and parochial schools in Iowa. The goal, he said, was to make it so a teacher wouldn't have to pay "a tremendous premium" to choose to work at St. Albert instead of elsewhere.

Enrollment forecast

Schweitzer said enrollment for this fall is already ahead of projections for the spring.

"We were conservative," he said.

About 35 new students in first through 12th grade have joined the school. The numbers remain fluid with enrollments taking place in the days before school starts. Connolly said enrollment had dropped off the past couple years because of larger graduating classes and smaller cohorts of young students.

Abby Jares, director of community relations, said the school budgeted for 641 students but should exceed that figure.

"Of course, we never know the exact final number until the first day of school," she said. "We estimate total enrollment to be in the range of 660-670 students "

As of September 1, 671 students are enrolled.

Financial health

Sixth-graders at St. Albert are now middle-schoolers by Scott Stewart, Nonpareil Education Reporter

St. Albert is dropping the "junior high" designation and moving to establish St. Albert Middle School.

But the shift is more than nomenclature.

"It is more than a name change," President Joe Connolly said. "It is actually taking a different approach."

Principal Dave Schweitzer said students who are young adolescents need a different response in school than those who are in their late teens, but it doesn't make sense to treat sixth-graders like they're still in primary school.

Middle-schoolers need a lot of experiences, interaction, structure, support and opportunities to take risks where negative consequences aren't so severe academically, socially and emotionally. Schweitzer said one key is having a group of teachers who want to work with the age group, because 11- through 13-year -olds can come across a little schizophrenic.

"One minute, they act like they're 30 years old; the next minute, they act like they're 5," Schweitzer said. "It is a incredibly important formative stage."

The culture of a middle school is fundamentally different from a junior high, which traditionally has seventh and eighth grades and treats students more like high-schoolers by focusing on subjects, traditional scheduling and academics. A middle school, on the other hand, aligns teachers together across disciplines to focus on groups of students, uses flexible schedules and encourages exploration instead of drilling down on subject matter.

Schweitzer said another key is providing positive and immediate support to middle-schoolers, as well as communicating and following-up with families.

"They can get the impression that they are not capable or that this is not something for them," he said. "We want to be very responsible and wrap around with



teachers who are aware of who is in their room and how well they are doing."

Teachers will be organized as a professional learning community across all three grades, allowing for joint planning and for coordination of how to do what's best for students. At the elementary level, teachers use grade-level planning, and at the high school level, teachers are organized into departments based on subject.

It's important for middle school students, though, that skills like writing have similar expectations in language arts as well as in social studies or religion, so they are taught to transfer those skills to different content areas. Expectations are important academically, and they're also important socially.

Part of the culture of St. Albert in general is setting clear expectations, but middle-schoolers need understanding, too. When a student calls someone a name, for example, that doesn't need to automatically trigger a call home. An adult who knows the student should talk to them, and if improvement is shown, that should be acknowledged.

However, that wasn't necessarily the environment the school had for its junior high, Schweitzer said.

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The elementary environment wasn't the best fit for sixthgraders, either, said Connolly, the school's president. Over the past couple years, the school physically moved them near the seventh and eighth grades to make it easier for students who are more advanced in math or other subjects to take classes.

"That kind of started the shift in culture to look at kids of all abilities," Connolly said. "We found that those sixth, seventh and eighth grades had a lot in common."

Sixth-graders had spent their day in self-confined classrooms with two teachers, one for reading and language arts and another for math and religion. They would line up to go to the bathroom, to physical education and to lunch. They would be monitored during recess.

In other words, they were treated the same as second-graders.

But after a year or two, they would be expected to carry several classes, juggling activities and increased homework demands, let alone outside jobs or other obligations. Some would start getting school permits at 15 so they could drive.

Schweitzer said there's a lot of ground to cover in terms of independence and responsibility.

"One of the hallmarks of middle school is provide opportunities for support for kids to struggle and make some mistakes," he said. "That is not the easiest thing to try to quantify."

An analogy he offered was when he saw a child, he was originally allowed to play in front of his house. Gradually, he was allowed to roam further: first his side of the block, then the entire block, then four blocks around his house. Eventually, he was allowed to go anywhere in the community.

Starting that path toward independence, self-monitoring and responsibility in sixth grade gives more breathing room as St. Albert students prepare for high school. The transition to young adulthood begins with preschoolers seeing seniors in the same building and looking up to older students as role models.



Schweitzer spent a decade as principal of Kirn Middle School before taking his current job at St. Albert in 2012. Many of the changes being implemented at St. Albert are similar to those used in other middle schools in the metropolitan area, including offering shorter elective classes for sixth-graders.

First-year middle-schoolers will have six-week exposure to subjects like art, journalism and information technology. Those electives become quarter-long and semesterlong courses as they progress through middle school, setting them up to choose what pathway of courses they will take starting as high-school freshmen.

"You make more choices about the things you want to do," Schweitzer said. "When you're ready for advanced coursework, you can move into some of our high school coursework. We have a lot of eighth-graders who have already completed high school credits in math."

Blending the middle school and high school eases the transition for those students. Schweitzer said younger students can also start participating in some activities for high school students, such as musicals and art exhibitions. Juggling those helps as students start to be expected to do more homework as they advance through the grades.

"It's a process," Schweitzer said. "It seems trite to say that. But it doesn't just happen."

St. Albert wrapping up renovation project with bathrooms by Scott Stewart, Nonpareil Education Reporter

St. Albert Catholic Schools is finishing renovations begun last year in its junior-senior high school wings.

An anonymous donor gave an undisclosed amount of money to the school in recognition of its 50th anniversary, which paid to renovate about 20 classrooms from the original 1964 building. That work was completed last summer in time for said. The improvements will bring new flooring, students returning for the school year.

Abby Jares, director of community relations, said bathrooms in the two academic wings are the focus of this year's renovation work at the school. She said the bathrooms have already been stripped down, with work planned to be finished by Aug. 27, the first day of the 2015-16 school year.

"This is a continuation of the renovations that we did last year," she said Wednesday afternoon. "The donor, who was anonymous, visited today and was really impressed by the progress."

Jares said initially the school thought one summer would be sufficient, but officials realized during planning that the classrooms needed to be the first priority and deferred work on the restrooms.

The work last year gutted classrooms and included new doors, new windows, new heating and cooling systems, matching lockers and other cosmetic touches, as well as the addition of fire sprinklers for those areas lacking them previously.

In addition to the improvements, the school also

dedicated a new crucifix at its high school entrance during the Feast of St. Albert to mark its golden anniversary. Special commemorations were also held during homecoming last year as well as the school's annual benefit auction in the spring.

Work is progressing quickly this summer, Jares stalls, sinks, toilets, tiles and fixtures to the bathrooms, bringing them to the standards of the rest of the facility.

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

Disbelief was the unmistakable expression on Owen Marshall's face.

The 9-year-old spent part of his Thursday morning volunteering at the Amelia Place senior living facility. He and a group of students from St. Albert Catholic Schools met twice a month to spend time with resident Helen Schulz.

Asked her age, Schulz invited guesses. Owen speculated mid-80s. Schulz indicated a higher guess was needed.

"99," she said, adding she'll become a centenarian on Nov. 13.

After a moment, Owen and Schulz returned to the activity at hand, using cotton balls held onto by clothes pins to paint beach balls yellow, red and blue.

"We usually sit with Helen and maybe one of her friends," Owen said. When the group from St. Albert arrives, they rush to join her, and they spend their visits doing crafts, reading, enjoying snacks and just spending time together.

When he's not at Amelia Place, Owen said he's usually playing baseball and basketball in the summer. His friend, Will Kirwan, 8, said he has a pool in his backyard before helping the facility's residents on her painting.

At previous visits, the group has worked on American flags for Independence Day, made necklaces out of beads, read books together and similar activities.



"It just feels good because sometimes the older people don't get that many visitors," Owen said. "It makes them happy when younger kids come and do some activity with them."

After a moment, Owen and Schulz returned to the For Schulz, the children bring laughter and good activity at hand, using cotton balls held onto by feelings.

"We just do everything," she said.

After the beach ball painting, students and seniors moved on to creating googly-eye octopuses from construction paper.

Teacher Lori Epperson said the relationship with Amelia Place was started when her father became



a resident. She said the school's two sections of second-graders began making the trips last fall, and she plans to continue to take students back next school year. This summer, volunteers are continuing the visits.

"As we've progress through the year, a lot of them have got their favorites," she said. "A big part of St. Albert is the service to others. We've always done something once a year service-wise for the kids." The Amelia Place volunteering, though, shows them that giving back isn't a one-time occurrence. It's something they can continue to do on an on-going basis. It also helps break misconceptions about senior communities.

"They thought it would be more like a hospital," Epperson said. "It is just spending time together."



In addition to visiting Amelia Place every month during the 14-15 school year, our 2nd graders also volunteered during the summer. Their summer projects included 4th of July decorations, a beachthemed project, and birthday cards for the residents who have summer birthdays.






